I hope you're all enjoying the summer and not getting heatstroke. On 7/14/12, your Board and other leaders of the congregation (the Worship Committee, the Search Committee, the Transition Task Force and others) met in side yard of Marilyn Mitchell's house for a three-hour "retreat." (UU's usually don't retreat except as a tactical maneuver). With Marilyn acting as our hostess and Rev. Mohr leading the discussion, we reviewed what we have accomplished, where we are and what we want to do in the coming year. It is important that members of the congregation know about our goals and help us work toward them, because without the rest of you, nothing will be accomplished. For many of us, First UU is an important part of our life, whether we see the church as a refuge or a jumping off point. And even though we all have differing views of what "religion" is and can be, most of us agree that we can do more together than separately. The main areas that we want to focus on this coming year are the following:

- We want to increase our membership to 85 members.
- We want to increase article pledges by \$5000.
- We want programming before and after Sunday service in conjunction with Vesper services.
- And we want to increase our public voice with joint ventures with other organizations such as EMEAC, MUUSJN, Rotary, Detroit Works and Moses, among others.

In order to accomplish these goals, we want to improve/better coordinate and make happen:

- Do more outreach through printed media
- Inviting friends
- Being more welcoming and following up with visitors
- Improve communication in all areas including digital and pre-digital methods of communication.

The Rev's Room

Here we are, at the last full month of summer. This a long article, as this has been an eventful season. And from my point of view, the summer has gone very well. I've been fortunate to get outside quite a bit for running and biking, canoeing and hiking – all sorts of physical activities and travel. I even ran my first adventure race, kind of like a triathlon. My race was a co-ed team event requiring us to trail run/hike, canoe, and mountain bike, all while orienteering with a map and a compass (no GPS allowed). We didn't win, but we did finish – that's good enough for a first go. And, as many of you noticed, I have dropped some serious weight, down thirty five pounds since May. I have perhaps that much to go, but I am feeling better every day, so I might just make it. Alas, none of my suits fit anymore, so I am making weekly trips to my tailor to have them taken in – if I look like I am wearing someone else's suit, that would be why. And my life is in renaissance mode, with lots of new growth across the board: spiritually, professionally, relationally, emotionally, and intellectually (Remember that I will be gone August 5-18 to do coursework for my doctorate). I am very excited and pleased.

It is probably also important to inform you that this spring my wife, who lives in Illinois, asked me for a divorce. *Her dedication to her career kept her in Illinois, and she could not share my enthusiasm for Detroit.* Sometimes it is just time to recognize and embrace the end of a relationship in order to make room for new growth. It is sad, as it had been nearly twenty good and loving years together. But we both agreed that it was the right decision. Sometimes it is necessary to let go of the good to achieve the better.

But most importantly, the church leadership and I have been working very hard to prepare for the coming church year. Our retreat this year focused largely on the functional areas of the Sunday service, as we identified what needs to be done, as well as what is and isn't getting done at present. To begin with, at the retreat, FUUD's leadership set the goals of increasing membership by 16%, from 73 last February to at least 85 members (we are at about 77 right now), and to grow pledge income from \$63k to \$68k, primarily through the increase in membership. I am sure you will be hearing more about that, as the board and relevant committees develop concrete plans and objectives in each area. Let's just say that there is significant room for improvement and much opportunity for all of us to further engage.

I will be in the pulpit three times a month this year (generally the first, second, and third Sundays), as I move to full time ministry here in Detroit. I am excited about my ministry here, as I have come to understand my work in Detroit much more clearly during the last year. I will be focusing on two primary goals and themes, with variation, or course. First is individual spiritual growth – speaking to FUUD's mission statement, to be "An urban center for social justice and spiritual renewal." The second speaks to the point of social justice, as I will be focusing on the goal of community formation and development, within the church of course, but also in the larger community of Midtown and Detroit as a whole. I have learned so much about this city this year, and I have a growing network of relationships and responsibilities that is drawing me more and more to economic development and urban planning within the city. I can clearly perceive my ministry here.

Indeed, last but not least, I want you to know that the board and I have agreed to pursue the possibility of a developmental ministry for me here (pending approval from the UUA and the Interim Ministers' Guild). A developmental ministry entails a three to five year commitment, between the church and me, to create and pursue a set of longer term objectives and projects. This is more than an interim ministry can accomplish. Moreover, the point of a developmental ministry is to stabilize and revitalize a struggling congregation, to establish a "new normal." After several decades of decline, the "normal' for this church is sorrow and frustration. A "new normal" for FUUD would be about success and joyful excitement. That is what we want to create together. I love this congregation and I love Detroit, and I am thrilled by the possibilities.
