I was blessed with a brain that I was allowed to use and which gave me the opportunity to get a scholarship for college.

I managed to survive my early adult years, despite making some questionable choices, and was again allowed to obtain more education for a nominal fee.

I was working with mentally challenged teenagers when I became pregnant and realized that giving birth to a child was no guarantee that the child would be born "normal". I was thankful to my concept of God when my child was born "normal."

Again I was blessed with fairly good health and the opportunity to earn a living doing something which I enjoyed.

I also happened to give a talk at First UU in the late 1960s when I was working with those wishing to adopt "hard to place" children. This gave me the opportunity to find out that First UU existed.

A little later when I returned to Detroit and had found Unitarian Universalism in other cities, I again sought out First UU in 1973 and felt that I had returned "home."

First UU has allowed me to explore my interests and challenge my intellect while putting me in contact with others I liked and felt comfortable with. So life is not perfect and mine certainly wasn't, but as I look back, I have so much be thankful for, I can't even put it in words.

So despite all the problems and challenges of life today, I'm sure you'll remember what things and people you have to be grateful for. Let's continue to remember our gratitude while we continue to wrestle with our personal and group challenges.

And another thing that this church can be grateful for is that Marsha Bruhn has agreed to fill the vacant slot on our Board of Trustees until the May congregational meeting. The Rev's Room

In conversations with leaders in our congregation, and in my own work as a writer and community leader, my thoughts about what it means to be a church are changing. It is almost a cliché that a church is made up of its members, not its building. But First Church is very much associated with our historic, cathedral-like structure at the corner of Cass and Forest. Indeed, for much of our recent history, the primary energy of the church has been to manage to maintain the building and pay for our facilities. In several significant ways, the church *was* the building.

But that is no longer the case. Predictably, when we were able to solve the problem of the facilities, the question of who we really are and what we are really about came up. We love our sanctuary, and many people reference it as the reason they were first attracted to the church. But the building is *not* the church. And if not, then what is it? What is the purpose of the First Unitarian-Universalist Church in Detroit?

Answering that question is very much on the minds of our congregational leaders. I have recently agreed to publish an article in the Journal of Religious Humanism discussing my thinking on the subject, and a number of our church leaders have come to me to discuss their own ideas. To try to state all of these perspectives concisely, I think the consensus is that *First Church exists to provide a focal point for gathering and growing the progressive community of metropolitan Detroit.* Now, that word “progressive” could be problematic, but it is not meant so much in the political sense, but in the religious sense of “faith in a better future.” We are, “An urban center for spiritual renewal and social justice.” *The church exists to bring people together to help create a better future for themselves and for Detroit.*

In one sense, that sense of being a focal “point” seems to imply “place.” But the community itself is what is really important. Our building could as easily house a fundamentalist Christian church. What makes our building important is that it provides us with a place to gather as a community. It also reflects our values and heritage of course, and that should not be under-rated. We need a space that can support our growth and reflects our history and inheritance. But what really matters is that we gather as a community of loving, rational people, interested in our individual and collective evolution as applied to the context of our lives and environment.

What that means is that we share a passion for progress, looking for opportunities to grow and improve our lives, as well as our community and culture. Thus, we gather to be challenged and inspired, looking for the services and programs of the church to help us to improve our lives and our world. But we also look to one another for opportunities to engage in beneficial and energizing work in the community. Church is a *networking* opportunity. We invite others who have ideas and resources to share in achieving the community's aspirations and ideals. Growth is a matter of achieving the goal of progress, of making better people in a better Detroit. *We grow to get better, not just bigger.* Thus, as we end this calendar year, we are on track to see significant growth in membership. But we remember that the goal of growth is community in pursuit of continuous improvement. The church is a community of progressive people, sharing their insights and opportunities for engagement in a project of holistic improvement. *The First UU Church in Detroit is a community that focuses on making it better, together!*

Rev. Mohr, Sally Borden and I conducted a UU Orientation session after church on November 4. Five prospective new members attended: Paul Chislett and Frank Butler from Windsor, Erich Cortright, Alicia Martinez and Matt Friedrichs. Dan Chicklas, who joined the Church on October 14th attended his second session. Dan has made a pledge covering the remainder of the fiscal year. On Sunday, November 11, we formally welcomed Nancy Owen-Nelson and Roger Zeigler to membership and Paul Chislett and Dawn Thomas signed the book. Accordingly, the Church has enrolled six (6) new members since Rev. Mohr arrived.

I am updating a list of active members as well as “friends of the church”, for a new church directory. If your address or telephone information has changed, please call or email me. I also intend to contact members we have not seen in church for some time, such as Janet Thompson, Carole Hosey and Jim Brown, to determine their intentions to continue their membership and invite them to return to church. Let me know if anyone has a special relationship with such persons so that a friendly phone call would be more appropriate. Under Article III, Section 3 of the By-Laws, a person who has not made a contribution of record during the present or prior fiscal year is to be sent an inquiry regarding desire to maintain membership and “will be removed from the membership list” unless an exemption is requested.

Finally, we heartily thank Joan Smykowski for making the new uniform nametags and we thank Tim Bailey for the numerous carpentry and other projects he undertakes to improve our building.

Rev. Mohr teaches Sustainable Spiritual Growth

(As appearing in *Natural Awakenings* magazine)

“Spiritual growth is not an unpleasant task to be suffered by strength of will,” say the Reverend Roger Mohr, a nationally recognized Humanist minister and pastor at First Unitarian Universalist Church, Detroit. “Spiritual growth is an exciting process of continuous improvement, one small insight and one small change at a time,” he adds. Rev. Mohr will lead a program about considering spiritual growth as an enjoyable daily process of transformation. The class is scheduled from 7 to 9 p.m., December 18, at the Detroit Athletic Club, in Detroit. Parking is available at the club for \$8; street parking may be available.

Rev. Mohr’s program is based on the principles of Reason and Compassion that are the foundation of the Humanist tradition. The basic principle is simple: Know Yourself. The goal is to get clarity about the real you, and what you need to do to care for that person. Rev. Mohr will discuss practices and ideas from world religions, along with scientific evidence and research, which is the core of Humanism. With more than a decade in ministry and advanced degrees in religion, psychology and business, Rev. Mohr has the experience and expertise to help people grow.
