As I sit here waiting for spring, as I do every year, I have to remind myself to be patient and that spring will come as it always does. I will be interested in your feedback about these goals and other ideas you may have to strengthen and improve our church.

The Rev's Room

As we head into the spring, I am pleased about where we stand as a congregation. We are no longer in a desperate struggle for survival, or just flapping our arms to slow the fall. We are emotionally stable, in the black financially with a balanced budget, adding many new members and seeing consistently strong attendance at services. It seems that I will be around to lead you for a while, so you are not facing a leadership crisis, which, although secondary to the budget, was a contributing part of the general anxiety.

So it seems like we are going to have to find something else to worry about. Or more positively, what would we like to create together? Thus, my agenda for this spring is to talk with you about what we want to do for next year.

As I evolve, I am developing a much more explicit vision for my ministry and what I can bring to our church. During my doctoral coursework, I was given a leadership test that sorted our styles between the Driver (Task/goal oriented), the Organizer (Detail/Procedure oriented), the Collaborator (Relationship oriented), and the Visionary (Mission oriented).

As it turns out, I am tied between Visionary and Collaborator, which means I am most concerned with the larger purpose and the emotional dynamics of the community. I look at the big picture and am concerned with how people interact. I am less of a Driver and not much of an Organizer, so I am not terribly agenda-focused, and prefer to leave details and compliance to others. That is an opportunity for the Drivers and Organizers among us to help balance my style, as well.

If we might say that the first two years of my work here have been about “communication,” I think the next step in my ministry to you will be about “leadership.” For me, the major focus of my ministry is leadership as spiritual practice. I am horrified and disgusted by the truly deplorable, selfish leadership we experience too often in our world. The leader who thinks only of self is a very poor example of the true potential of leadership.

Yet effective leadership enables people to get good things done. The proper role of leadership is in creating and developing excellence in the community as *a whole*. The concept of “Ubuntu” that recurs in my preaching, and that I announced as a major theme for the year, is about the way that we empower and enlighten one another by our own attempts to achieve excellence together. “Excellence” means simply to do better than before in whatever we try to do. Leadership is about creating the circumstances that help all of us to do better together.

I want to develop a culture of Ubuntu among our leaders, so that we all become more pro-active about creating an environment in which we can achieve excellence, both individually and collectively. And so, my ministry to you is to help create a model of leadership where by we work together in the creation of the beloved community. As a visionary collaborator, I hope my leadership may be nourishing and empowering to this community.

Membership Drive And Annual Canvass

Your membership committee and canvass chairperson is challenging YOU to own your commitment to First Unitarian-Universalist Church by March 17, St. Patrick's Day. Sunday, **March 10th**, the Church welcomes new members to the congregation, and we enjoy a potluck lunch. Several of you have been attending our church for weeks and months, and you know you like it here. So, come on! Sign the membership book on March 10th, accept a chalice pin and feel good about yourself for making one of the important commitments in your life.

March 10th is also the Sunday I intend to kick off the 2013-2014 Canvass. There will be a Canvass table in McCollester Hall, and we will invite all members and pledging "friends" to make a pledge for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013 and ending June 30, 2014.

It is crucial to complete the pledging process in March so our Treasurer can prepare a realistic budget to present to the congregation for a vote in May. The biggest item in the budget, of course, is Rev. Mohr's salary. He is committed to First Church, to Detroit and to all of us, but he needs to know we can afford each other.

Membership growth and financial stability were critical factors in persuading the UUA to approve a Developmental Ministry for our church. Developmental Ministry is a new program that allows Rev. Mohr to remain as our minister for at least the next four years. Continued stability and sustained growth on the corner of Cass and Forest will secure our future.

So many new members and friends have joined us over the past twelve months that our membership rolls currently list seventy-eight (78) members and 8 pledging "friends". If YOU have not yet joined, now is the time. I have placed an order for more lapel pins and wallet cards in anticipation of a successful membership drive!

97th Birthday Celebration: Fundraiser to Benefit the Preservation of our Skinner Organ

A concert of organ, flute and vocals will be given on April 6, 2013 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., featuring Grampa Jenkins from SideBar Black Art Theatre of Detroit. Free tickets can be reserved at <http://www.eventbrite.com/event/5555939966>. Donations will be accepted at the door. Wine, cheese and food will be available for purchase, and a silent auction will be held.

Our four manual, 52 rank, Opus 232 Ernest M. Skinner organ is one of the finest orchestral organs in the Detroit area. It was built in 1915 by the Ernest M. Skinner Company of Boston, MA. It is one of the few Skinner organs still in an unaltered state from its installation. The organ was dedicated in 1916 to the memory of Simon Jones Murphy and Ann Door Murphy, Charter Members of the church, by their daughter Annie Dorr Murphy.

The specific purpose of the funds raised is to pay for the updating of the electrical power source. The organ still has its original power source, and power surges are causing the magnets to go bad. When an organist presses a key, it is the action of the magnets that allows the air to go through a pipe and make a sound. Or as Robert Johnson explained it, there are little magical gnomes running around in the organ that make it work, and we need funds to feed them. Either way, our goal is to raise \$1000 through a series of fundraisers.

If you are interested in donating wine or cheese, supplying or soliciting items for the silent auction, and/or volunteering as an usher, greeter, sommelier, silent auctioneer, or hot dog vendor, please track down one of the Organ Fundraising Committee members. UUSC's Not-So-Hidden Treasure

The National Volunteer Network

One of the UUSC's most valuable assets comes in the form of people power: the National Volunteer Network. Engaging fellow congregation members in UUSC's work, these volunteers gain personal growth and development while helping UUSC thrive.

The mainstay of the Volunteer network is the local representative, who serves as a direct link between their congregation and UUSC. Local reps build solid relationships with congregational leadership, such as ministers, religious education professionals, board members, and social action committees. The local reps are UUSC's eye-to-eye partners in their congregations - people who are close to the ground, know and are trusted by those they serve, and share with UUSC their experience of how to best achieve mutual goals.

Local reps and other congregational volunteers help to raise approximately 12 percent of UUSC's annual revenue, a vital component of UUSC's annual budget. There are local reps serving in over 540 congregations nationwide. They are an important reason that UUSC is able to put 87 percent of its expenses toward program work, not administration. Local reps are vital in helping UUSC communicate effectively by mobilizing their congregations to act together when urgent issues need member participation.

Regional coordinators are experienced volunteer leaders who mentor 10 or so local reps in nearby congregations. Local reps not under the jurisdiction of a regional coordinator are mentored by UUSC staff. Regional coordinators aren't liaisons for a specific congregation, but they do help UUSC connect more broadly

with UU districts and clusters. UUSC supports the Volunteer Network leadership with an annual training conference and ongoing support resources.

The Volunteer Network leadership also includes national co-chairs, who participate in volunteer policy decisions. The co-chairs, who oversee three territories in the United States, nominate and mentor 9-12 regional coordinators in their territory. In addition to the roles listed above, UUSC also has a multitude of project coordinators - people who help with specific campaigns, such as Justice Sunday, an annual program that provides resources for learning, reflection, and action on a key human rights issue. More than 340 people facilitate Justice Sunday and many more work on other programs and projects.

The Volunteer Network - grassroots supporters joining together in their dedication to human rights - is one of UUSC's treasures. UUSC could not be as effective as it is without these volunteers!
