# Letter from the President

I was struck by the October 18, 2013 article in the *Detroit Free Press* on the generosity of former Detroit resident Jeff Adler in providing a total of \$750,000 to seven groups to help in the City's revitalization. The gifts ranged from \$250,000 to Wayne State University's School of Nursing to \$50,000 to the North Rosedale Park Civic Association. As a resident of North Rosedale Park and now heading a major capital campaign to renovate our Community House and grounds, I enjoyed speaking with Jeff about his plans to give back to his community—about setting an example for others to follow, to look back at where they've been and support those who need help.

It reminded me of 1<sup>st</sup> UU as a community that nourishes us, and the many ways in which our members nourish the congregation in return. We may be a small church in terms of membership, but a well-developed web of committees and personnel make Sunday services, evening Vespers, programming and building maintenance possible. At the core of this web is the Board of Trustees, our office and music staff and our minister, but then the web fans out into worship, communications, building and grounds, membership, finance, GLBT relations, development, nominating, hospitality, activities, young adults, and outreach and social justice. Most recently, members tackled the grueling job of cleaning the choir loft, repairing the dangerous flooring, erecting new high efficiency lighting (in the rain!), and trimming trees--many examples of a committed community of church members.

Our continued growth is equipping us for the church's upcoming 100<sup>th</sup> year celebration in April 2016. To ensure its success, we will be looking to you, our membership, to provide leadership and input. Colleen Dolan-Greene will be bringing her superb organizational skills as chair of this momentous event.

# The Rev's Room

As the autumn weather begins to make itself felt, and the trees show their colors, I am reminded of the natural rhythms and pace of the year. This month we officially begin the holiday season, as Thanksgiving will be upon us before we know it. I am honestly a little impatient with the holiday season. For me it is a time of waiting, when I would much rather be working. During the holidays, meetings become more difficult to arrange, my usual routines and rhythms are disrupted, my regular stops become randomly more crowded or abandoned, and my usual playmates are distracted by other obligations. I like my rhythm and routines, and I don't appreciate having them disrupted.

However, I also recognize that many (perhaps most) people feel that the holidays are better understood more as opportunities to enjoy their lives, or at least as a welcome reprieve from the daily grind. The holidays are about family and friends, social gatherings and festive decorations. They are about sharing and caring, an opportunity to show their love and concern. Those are good things! I second that emotion.

Yet I am mindful that I have only a few weeks left to accomplish my agenda for this calendar year. I am aware of the sand slipping through the hour glass of this year a bit more quickly than I like. The turning leaves are a signal to me to pick up the pace! There is time only for one or two projects before the sand runs out, and the leaves cover the ground. My goal this year is to be ready for the holiday hiatus, in part so that I do not find myself under-prepared or out of position. And in part so that I am emotionally ready to wait it out, with my anxiety under control. I have to work before the year falls down around me!

But I think that the reminder that I am subject also to the laws and limitations of nature and time is the more important point. I need to relax and learn to adjust to the broader rhythms and patterns of our church, our culture(s), our planet, and the universe as a whole. I am willful, and I set a difficult pace - I like it more, better, faster. That may be sustainable for me perhaps, at least for now. But it is not necessarily what is best for others, or even for myself. The fall is a meditation on living in rhythm and harmony with the Cosmos. May we each find our own pace and peace.

All the windows of the mansions first and second floors were replaced. The windows along the alley in McCollester as well as the window above the ramp were as well. The old windows and frames in McCollester Hall date back to early 1960's. No one knows how old the windows in the mansion are. Many thanks go to the funders who include: Midtown Inc, the Erb Foundation, the Detroit Economic Growth Corporation (DEGC), and member and individual donations. First UU was prominent among the individual donors.
