President's Letter

I have just come from the all-church picnic, held at Shelter 12 right near the swimming area on Belle Isle, and organized in large part by members of the young adult group at First UU.

It was a year and a half ago that twelve young adults met in my living room to ascertain their level of interest in forming a young adult group in the church, the kinds of activities they were interested in, and what each person was willing to do to help bring this about. At first there were occasional gettogethers and potlucks in member homes. Then meeting dates were set for the third Sunday of the month, following the church service.

The energy of the group blossomed with the highly successful 'In-Grounds Café' during Noel Night, service projects such as building tactile tools for blind children, and most recently an ambitious food drive. The idea for an all-church picnic evolved from the Choir Fest last February with ten participating UU churches from southeastern Michigan. How about a picnic? Would you be interested in participating? Yes and yes!

As I watched Matt Friedrichs, Joel Batterman and Beth Bailey be recognized for their role in planning and executing the picnic, I couldn't help but think back to that meeting in my house when the groundwork was laid for building community among the younger members of the congregation. But that community building has extended to all of us and to our fellow UU congregations. There were about 120 of us at Shelter 12 from First UU, Paint Creek, Emerson, Birmingham, Northwest and probably other churches. Some came early and helped with weeding at the Conservatory. Some set up for the picnic and started the grills. A whole bunch fanned out across the island for the Scavenger Hunt. A lot of us sat and conversed after enjoying an incredible assortment of food. A book table of UU publications attracted buyers. Babies played on a blanket. It was an amazing day.

The energy we experienced on Belle Isle is reflective of the energy that's emerging throughout the First UU congregation. Thanks to the involvement of so many of our members, we should expect a future of continued growth and development and expanded visibility in the wider community.

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The Rev's Room

As I write this month's newsletter article, I am sitting in the closing session of Gamaliel's National Clergy Leadership Training. Gamaliel is the parent organization for MOSES (Metropolitan Organizing Strategies Enabling Strength), which is an organization dedicated to social justice, especially regarding race and class. Many of our members have been or are involved, and two of our young adult members (Matt Friedrichs and Joel Batterman) are actually employed by MOSES in truly missional work in the city of Detroit and the larger region. MOSES is a significant expression of the ministry of First Unitarian Universalist Church.

I admit that over the last two or three years of my work in Detroit, MOSES has been peripheral to my attention, and Gamaliel has not been on my radar at all. I have been busy helping to get the church back on track, not to mention just trying to get a basic map of the multi-dimensional funhouse that is Detroit and SE Michigan. The functioning of First Church has been, and will continue to be, my very highest priority. For me, First Church is indeed first.

Ostensibly, despite some remaining challenges and issues, we are fortunate to have done a great deal to reverse the decline of the church. I believe that if we can resolve some financial and facility issues, we may well be able to achieve sustainable growth into the foreseeable future. And with growth comes the challenge of developing opportunities for ministry for our members and for our church as a whole. It is my belief that Unitarian Universalists need to consciously live out their religious commitments in practical commitments to action in the wider world, for the sake of the world and for *ourselves*.

As we move into the next church year, know that I am thrilled with the progress of the church. In many ways, ministers are limited in their spiritual evolution by the functioning of their churches, even as the spiritual wellbeing of church communities limit, and are limited by, the spiritual wellbeing of their members. A church that is struggling simply to hold off their own pain and fear forces a minister to focus on that too, usually, and most ministers are pulled down to the functioning level of their churches. It is the basic premise of Ubuntu – if one is stronger we are stronger, but in the same way, if one suffers, we all suffer. First UU is growing stronger by the day, and that allows me to grow stronger as well, to find a deeper and more profound personal spirituality, and therefore offer to you

a deeper and more profound ministry. As we continue on out path together, may we each and all be blessed with one another, and to share that blessing with the world. First Church is a blessing to all of us.

Sharing that blessing is the path for our evolution. Next year, I think we will be ready to begin our collective ministry, as a congregation. We are ready for new beginnings, in general, even as we clear away some of the old patterns and procedures. We are growing in many ways, not just membership. There are some growing pains, of course, difficult choices and changes. But that is always part of growth – what used to work is not adaptive forever, and to evolve often means making some sacrifices. We are beginning to gain a new sense of meaning, significance, ministry, dignity, and mission. That is my priority. This year, I believe that we will be ready to share that blessing.

Food Drive

The Outreach Committee is excited to announce the beginning of an ongoing food drive (should we call it a FUUD Drive?). We will be collecting nonperishable food items to support the Cass Community United Methodist food program. Collection will take place every Sunday during coffee hour, and the food will be delivered to Cass Community on a weekly basis. Our goal is to collect 455 items before the end of 2014. That may seem like a lot, but it's only 5 items per congregation member!

The program we will be supporting prepares over 20,000 hot meals each week for families and individuals who need them most. Please read the following guidelines to ensure that your donations are best aligned the program's needs: Nonperishable items only. Please avoid soups. (Canned soups are great for pantries that provide take-home boxes to families; but are not appropriate for preparing large meals with.) Staples are most needed (rice, flour, sugar, etc.). Canned veggies and meats are needed. Peanut butter and jelly are needed.

You walk into the sanctuary on a Sunday morning. The lights are on.

You see the tall candles and candle snuffer on the white runner gracing the altar table. Numbers of the hymns and responsive reading are on the wooden rack next to the minister's pulpit.

If you look closely, you'll see glasses of water on that pulpit and on the table across the way for the Cantor and Worship Leader. In front of the podium on the left are two healthy green plants—that's where the extra water from those three glasses is poured after the service.

The Worship Leader notices that the Order of Service is already atop the pulpit, but may not have noticed that it is taped—when fans were used, it tended to blow off.

On the back of the Order of Service is a list of ushers, who had been recruited in advance, and are not the same ones every week, though most often you'll see the name John Angry.

As you walk towards coffee, on the radiator are greeting cards for members with birthdays, anniversaries, post-surgery or otherwise recovering.

After coffee, if you leave through the Nartex (foyer) the doors are already locked, though exiting is easy.

All of this and more was done by our John Angry.

He also gives hearing receivers to anyone needing them.

Before the service, he walks through to clean up litter from any events of the prior day. Afterwards, he checks the pews for items left behind—Orders of Service and clothing, caps and bags—returning the latter to owners if he can find them.

A few years ago, I followed John around one morning to write this kind of article. I could not keep up with him. With impending eye surgery, John asked me to write this up in case he couldn't make it to church following it afterwards.

Even so, it has had to be revised—for additions, of course. And when we had to use the list one Sunday morning, it took four or five people to do what he does.

When we're talking "activity," he is the epitome.

John Angry turns 85 on June 4th. Let's celebrate him.

Detroit-area choirs gather for music, community

Every other year since 2003, the choirs of many Unitarian Universalist congregations in the Detroit, Michigan, area have come together for a music festival. The latest was March 9 at First UU Church of Detroit.

At the first festival there were eight choirs; this year there were choristers from ten congregations, with a total of about 130 singers.

"This is just an amazing experience every time we do it," said Al Acker, a longtime choir member with First UU. "The thing I like most is that my own choir on a good Sunday will have only twelve or thirteen members. To sing with a group of more than 100 is just such a wonderful experience. Also, we get to work with the music directors of other congregations. And once we've learned these songs we can sing them at other services throughout the year."

It's a lot of music to learn, he acknowledged. "That's why we only do this every other year." The choirs practice the numbers at home then gather Saturday for practices and lunch. They come back Sunday for the performance.

Acker said most of the 80 to 90 members of First Unitarian contributed to the concert by singing, providing and serving the lunch, helping with parking, or ushering. The concert is held in a different location every year.

In addition to First Unitarian, the congregations that participated are First UU Church of Ann Arbor, Birmingham Unitarian Church, Emerson Church UU, New Hope UU Congregation, Northwest UU Church, Paint Creek UU Congregation, Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church, UU Church of Farmington, and the UU Church of Olinda, at Ruthven, Ontario.

The original idea for the concert came from Todd Ballou, music director at the Detroit congregation and Anna Speck, the then-music director at Grosse Pointe. "It's become one of the rare opportunities to get people together from all the area congregations," said Ballou.

Special guests sometimes appear. This year Naomi Long Madgett, the poet laureate of Detroit, read some of her poems. UU songwriter Carolyn McDade led some of the songs several years ago. "Sometimes we can't decide if this is a church service with tons of music or a choir concert with some speaking parts. This year it was more of a concert," said Ballou.
