November 1st - "OK, Wasn't Halloween Just Grand?"

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray Halloween is one of the most beloved holidays of the year, in part because we celebrate while intentionally taking on an identity that is not our own. Looking at different ways of celebrating Halloween, we also will look at what this holiday has meant in Detroit.

November 8 – "Remembering All Souls"

Earlier this week, on November 2nd, is the traditional observation of "All Souls' Day," and observance of those who have passed. While All Souls' Day was first instituted at the monastery in Cluny in 993 CE and quickly spread throughout the Christian world, people held festivals for the dead long before Christianity. We will examine some of the ways people have honored the dead across time and cultures.

November 15 – "The world on autopilot: To whom do we trust the future?" Robert Johnson

Who decides which way our future heads? Who do we trust to pick our path? Or are we merely letting fortune and short term considerations decide our path? And what are the ramifications of doing so?

November 22 – "My Journey in See Minor" Lee Thume

We'll take a musical journey together. Lee Thume is one of five children, four of whom were born legally blind, during the Depression, of a legally blind-piano tuner. Lee will share with us how she worked at problem solving after getting her major in music.

November 29 – "Thankings and Beginnings"

Many of us are just on the other side of celebrating Thanksgiving, an utterly American holiday. What have we been thankful for in our lives, and how does being thankful open the doors for changes in how we live? This day marks the beginning of Advent, the Christian season before Christmas, and we will ask, as the "Christmas Season" of Santa and elves and brightly lit trees dominates our cultural consciousness, what Advent might mean for faith and for those who cannot help but observe.

Letter from your Minister...

Letter from your Interim Minister, Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray:

Autumn came late to Michigan this year. Up to the end of last week, my family and I still swam in our pool, the leaves remaining green and in the trees, whereas last year we were desperate to close up the pool for the season because so many leaves of brown and yellow and red had fallen into its depths. But now the weather has turned, the cold mornings welcoming the brew of hot coffee to warm our hands as we wake into the dark.

I love this time of year, with the cocoon of sweaters and the crackle of fireplaces helping to relieve the loss of the summertime fun. We play in the newly downed leaves, carve pumpkins with our children, and prepare ourselves for the cacophony of holidays in this season, both sacred and secular. Halloween brings ghouls and goblins to our door, sated by sugary sweets. Thanksgiving is a spectacular feat in Detroit, with our parade being the second largest in America, after the Macy's Thanksgiving Parade in New York City. And then the full swing of the December holidays of Hannukah and Christmas and Kwanzaa, and Diwali and the Winter Solstice as well. The light in the world grows less and less in December, welcoming the snows which carpet the earth, until the darkness reaches its zenith, and then a return to growth and life.

This is all a reminder of the constancy of change, this simple fact that when we are bold enough to step outside of the comfortable boundaries of our own backgrounds, our own expectations and our own prejudices, our own fears, we are able to encounter a rich, enticing, multichromatic world in which we are no longer the prisoners of our own imagination, but the astonished inheritors of the entire spectrum of what it means to be human, beautifully human, flawed and imperfect, but still glimmering with the image of God in which we were made, each and every one of us. When we stay in one place our whole lives, we do not challenge ourselves to realize that the world is a whole lot bigger, more diverse, always tending toward change, than we ever give it credit for, perhaps even more than we want to believe.

People react differently to encountering something new, something unexpected. Some folks embrace the opportunity to experience the unknown while others are scared, intimidated, shun what is outside their norm, their day to day way of living in the world. And we all get into that place sometimes, that place where we shut down and shut out, when the world is too much, too big, and we prefer the company that we keep, thank you very much, the people who look like us, dress like us, pray like us. We are terrified by the prospect of connection that might rock our world and shatter that misperception that we had it all together, that we know all that we need to know.

I encourage you, if you don't know it, to find a book, Howard's End, written by the wonderful British author E.M. Forster. And yes, yes, the movie version with Anthony Hopkins and Emma Thompson is excellent as well, but for goodness sake, put down the remote control and go find the book! And as you open it, and begin flipping through the pages, and no worries, no spoiler alert here, because they are the literally very first words that you will find, before the first chapter begins, there is a page that is blank except for only two words, two words which set the context for the entire rest of the book, which set the challenge for what humanity must do, must become, must achieve: Only connect. Those two simple words, "Only connect," are all that appear on that lone page, that simple charge to the reader. It comes up again later, and no, I won't ruin the whole book for you, but it comes up later, more fulsome this time, "Only connect! That was the whole of her sermon. Only connect the prose and the passion, and both will be exalted, and human love will be seen at its height. Live in fragments no longer. Only connect, and the beast and the monk, robbed of the isolation that is life to either, will die."

That is such an important idea, that when we live without connecting, we live merely in fragments. We do not live the full, flowering, thriving lives that we could. There is something bestial, there is something self-mortifying, life-denying, about turning down, refusing the opportunity to connect when the opportunity is there, right in front of you, and you do not take it because you are intimidated, you are scared, by what that connection might mean, how that connection will shape you, change you, transform you. We are frightened that by making the connection we will no longer be who we were before, and you know what, we are right. When we make connections, we cannot be who we were before. The innocence of isolation is sacrificed on the altar of opportunity when we encounter what we do not know, and we are made bigger, sturdier, worldly, increasingly compassionate, entirely more empathetic when we face the unknown, touch the unknown, caress the face of the unknown and trace our hands over the curves of the face and skin and hair and lips and eyes and nose of the unknown, and realize that the unknown is not the person to fear, but the fellow child of God. The unknown is the fellow child of God who grew up with different stories, who was taught a different way of valuing what she sees, comprehending what he hears. The unknown is the slightly shifted mirror image of ourselves, born into a different part of this vast world than the microcosm that we know.

Letter from your Board President, Kathe Stevens:

Greetings to the First UU Detroit community!

At its October meeting, your Governing Board made decisions which will impact our future – the near future and looking out to 2017 and beyond.

The biggest news is that the board voted to begin the process to call a settled minister. This process will begin formally in January 2016 with the hope to call a settled minister for the summer of 2017. Meanwhile, the Board and the Nominating Committee will be considering names for potential candidates to serve on a Settled Minister Search Committee – an 18-month commitment and an extremely important one. If the Nominating Committee calls, please carefully consider giving your time and energy to this essential work for the future of our church. A vote will be taken to approve a slate of candidates at a special congregational meeting on December 13, 2015 (see the notice with details on the first page of this newsletter).

We're so glad to have Rev. Murray with us during our interim period. Rev. Murray's previous experience as an interim minister will help to guide us to see ourselves from a fresh perspective and assess what type of minister would be best to lead our congregation in the future. As wonderful as Rev. Murray is, I'm delighted the board has decided to start the process to call a full-time minister. I'm grateful to the board and other leaders in the congregation who continue to keep the church running smoothly. A full-time minister will push us beyond running smoothly to running with gusto!

The Board also approved a "Share the Plate" program for First UU. Last year, Joan Smykowski and I attended a UU Stewardship Conference on "Building a Culture of Generosity" at which we learned that many congregations share the plate on a regular basis, which increases their own plate contributions during that collection. This seems like the ultimate win-win situation: we'll be contributing to the greater community while helping our own. The Worship, Social Justice and Finance committees will be working out the details.

In other news: Over 20 folks created objectives and action steps for our 2016 goals at the Congregational Planning meeting let by Deanna McGraw on Saturday, October 10. This congregation's involvement and enthusiasm in planning for the future is outstanding. The Planning Committee will input all the information into a formal document to be approved by the board and presented to the congregation as the *2016 Strategic Plan* at the December 13 congregational meeting. Heartfelt thanks to Deanna for lending her impressive skill set!

Interweave describes itself as "queer UUs and friends, building up connections, breaking down oppressions." The first meeting will be on November 15 at 1:00 PM at the Bronx Bar. Thanks, Irene and Nathan!

As I've mentioned before, I've been reaching out to other UU board presidents to make connections with other UU churches in southeast Michigan. I've had a lovely lunch with the president and vice-president of Birmingham Unitarian Church and am communicating with the presidents of UU Church of Farmington and Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church to organize dates to meet. GPUC sent a flyer for its annual auction, which is its big fundraiser. In the spirit of what I hope will be even more regional cooperation, the flyer is included in this newsletter at page 14.

I'm proud that we're part of the Cass Corridor Commons. Our building, which has been a hub of activity for almost 100 years, continues to be filled with voices of the community. On October 30 and 31 the World African Martial Arts Conference will take place in the DBlair Theater, continuing on Sunday, November 1 from 9:00am to 3:00pm. On November 1 the Center for Community Based Enterprise (C2BE) will be in the Parlor from 2:30pm to 5:00pm. I know we'll offer our usual radical hospitality to WAMA and C2BE participants.

Dan Wiest's Tribute to Grace Lee Boggs

On Sunday, October 11, Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray read this essay by First UU congregant Dan Wiest. I thought it was important to share with those who weren't fortunate enough to be present that day to hear Dan's tribute to Grace Lee Boggs and her connection with First Unitarian-Universalist Church of Detroit:

"Grace"

Most of you have heard, read or seen testimonials for Grace Lee Boggs, who passed on this last Monday [October 5]. You're probably aware that she was involved with the Black Power movement, workers' rights, urban gardens, education reform, Detroit Summer, (r)Evolution, feminism; that she wrote "Living for Change" and "The Next American Revolution"– the list goes on.

But did you know of her connections with First UU? Did you know that Detroit Summer, perhaps Grace and Jimmy's most enduring legacy, was originally based here and stayed until about 2005? Did you know that the memorial service for her husband, Jimmy Boggs was held in this Sanctuary? Of the times that Ruby Dee, Ossie Davis and Danny Glover would walk our halls because of her?

Did you know of the regular book discussions that were held here where Grace first started her drive for changing yourself to change the world? Books that challenged; books that inspired; books that outraged. Science Fiction books by Octavia Butler and Ursula Le Guin to show parallels; books by Walter Mosley to give a view of what happens on the other side of the tracks; books that reflected how much of our society was morphing into the mindset of a fast-food culture; books on education to show what was possible for Detroit schools; books by J.K. Rowling so that we could include youths in our discussions; books by hip-hop artists to try to keep up with the times. The common threads were of books that could foster connections and promote transformation.

Grace was often suspicious of the preachers in Detroit because she felt their egos got in the way of accomplishing more for the community. But an affinity was shared between Grace and First UU. Events for the Left in Detroit often alternated between the Boggs Center on Field Street and here at the corner of Cass and Forest. Included were a lot of individuals, groups and ideas that shared that orbit which would include the founders of the Women's Coffeehouse, Avalon Bakery, the Coalition Against Police Brutality, Horizons in Poetry, the Cass Food Co-op, East Michigan Environmental Action Council and others.

Some of you may not have been here in the days when the Cass Corridor was far from being held up as a beacon for the rebirth of Detroit. Grace was heavily involved in this area during that time to put the neighbor back in the hood long before it became a catch-phrase. As she was pushing for us to do more, Grace would often comment on the importance of First UU in its role in the local community as well as the city's future.

So now a large torch has been passed. Realize that the flame of our chalice has been and continues to be an important part of that torch. It is our turn to carry this flame as we aspire to liberate the truth, radiate kindness and to love courageously. So go in peace. Go with Grace.







