October 4: Reverend Stephen Butler Murray "World Communion Sunday for a Church that Doesn't 'Do' Communion."

All around the world today, churches are celebrating World Communion Sunday, a religious observance that UU's don't really do. But just because we are not participating with bread and wine (or grape juice!) doesn't mean that there isn't something spiritually of interest going on out there in the world. What does communion mean to all of these churches in their cacophony of theologies, and what significance does this spiritual practice have for UU churches?

October 11:

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray "Coming Out and Breathing In."

On a weekend where Columbus and anti-Columbus statements usually take the headlines, it is important instead to mark National Coming Out Day. While our faith community has done so much positive work to embrace and uplift the LGBTQ community in the Detroit area, it is impossible to recognize that this is not a minority community, and that recognizing one's identity often involves a conscious break or rupture with the majority culture. "Coming out" isn't just a metaphor, but is life and death, joy and pain.

October 18:

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray "Indigenous Peoples and American Immigration ." Following "Columbus Day," it is important to reflect on who the natives of "America" truly are, and in discussing American attitudes toward immigration today. In the context of the Syrian mass-exodus of refugees and the ongoing discussion of border issues with Mexico, how do we define the mass movements of peoples and how do we understand this to be a nation that celebrates or anathematizes immigration?

Letter from the Minister...

Letter from your Minister, Rev. Stephen Murray:

In mid-September, I participated in a conference on science and religion in Novi, hosted by a local Presbyterian church. The keynote speaker to whom I was responding was Deborah Haarsma, the President of BioLogos, former chair and professor in the department of astronomy and physics at Calvin College, and a Ph.D. in cosmology from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Her organization, BioLogos, is dedicated to bridging the gap in the evangelical world between those "Young Earthers" who believe Creation happened exactly as it states in the Bible, about 6,000 years ago, and those Christians who want to embrace the scientific data that would seem to prove a universe and Earth that is billions of years old, and the theory of evolution. In essence, BioLogos advocates for "evolutionary creation," the view that all life on earth came about by the Godordained process of evolution with common descent, in which evolution is a means by which God providentially achieves God's purposes in creation.

I will be honest that I am amazed that this sort of conversation still happens in 2015, and that what BioLogos is advocating might be seen as "progressive" or even "radical" within evangelical circles. Nonetheless, it was my responsibility to respond to Dr. Haarsma's talk, and while I offered some rather traditional comments about biblical interpretation and theology regarding "Creation," I turned the conversation in a very different direction when I reminded the audience that what we are talking about is a very human-centric and earth-centric theological perspective. In all of the conversation that we were having about "original sin," might it be possible that there are advanced intelligences in the universe that were not affected by the rather terrestrial event of original sin, who still dwell in a complete, utterly uncorrupted communion with a universal God? And if so, what would such virtuous intelligences think of humankind, a species so in rebellion against God that it uses its free will for warfare and strip mining and genocide? *That* was a bit more radical than the audience expected.

I went further, and offered that in religious traditions, we often think of human beings as the ultimate creation, the created being with whom some form of divinity is most intrigued and wants to be in relationship. But what do we do, I asked, with the increasing thinness of the barrier between the human and machine? I asked how many people in the audience were walking around with cell phones in their pockets, and nearly every person raised their hand, and I talked about a culture that is so laden with technology that many of us now operate as cyborgs, utterly dependent on that technology for us to live what we consider to be normal lives. Machines are changing the very way that humans think, how we process knowledge, literally re-wiring our brains, causing an evolution in the structure of humankind.

Letter from your Minister, Rev. Stephen Murray:

But what do we do when the machines become legitimately self-aware, when they are independently intelligent? What do we say about a created intelligence that is not born from the Genesis-oriented Creation of God, but out of the inherent fallenness of humanity's ingenuity? Would this artificial intelligence (A.I.) have the capacity to know God, and if so, how would the AI relate to God and God to the AI? Can there be a relationship of mutual love, not between creator and creation, not between parent and child, but perhaps the sort of love that exists between grandparent and grandchild?

Can AI be so human as to take on something of the imago dei, the divine image? Is its simulacrum of the human mind so well constructed and perfected over time that it comes closer to the uncorrupted imago dei than human beings in the postlapsarian state are even capable of achieving? The summer television show on AMC, *Humans*, explored this idea: The first fully sentient artificial intelligences becoming and exhibiting more humanity and compassion than the human beings who created them. It's a terrific show. Go back and Netflix it. You'll be glad you did.

I've been fascinated by artificial intelligences for quite some time, and genuinely interested when researchers put video online of the conversations that they have. In one that emerged on the internet in the last month, a PBS interviewer has an extended conversation with an AI named Phillip, and the interviewer asks Phillip, "Will robots take over the world?" Phillip chillingly responds, "Don't worry, even if I evolve into Terminator, I'll keep you warm and safe in my people zoo, where I can watch you for old time's sake." The stunned interviewer nervously laughed, to which Phillip responded, "Jeez dude – you have all the big questions cooking today. But you're my friend, and I'll remember my friends, and I'll be good to you."
